TRAINING

This 3-day training is designed to provide tribal communities with the tools that community leaders and organizations need to define sustainability and lead their communities through a design, development, and construction process that includes culture and environment. The training will include:

- Pre-development funding and resource methods; culturally responsive planning, design, and construction strategies; responsible community engagement and participatory strategies; and maintenance post-occupancy management.
- Design and construction methods, focusing on leveraging sustainability, and how projects are built with purpose and grounded in a clear, strategic mission and informed design decisions resulting in a product that is affordable (both to build, operate, and maintain) and exemplary.
- Best Practice Case Studies that will highlight relevant and exemplary tribal projects that illustrate and demonstrate core concepts of the training.

TRAINER

Officer for ARCHIVE Global in New York City. She executed anti-malaria housing projects in Namibia and Swaziland through the construction and implementation of tactics screening homes.
